


Excellence Matters

YOUR BEST AT WORK

Throughout the Bible, we are constantly being shown examples of excellence. Why? Because God does nothing short of excellence himself. Therefore, we should always pursue our very best, too.

Excellence matters. And the more we pursue excellence, the greater influence we have with our peers and in the marketplace. Being excellent at what we do will point back to the one who gave us the ability to do our work. It takes a tremendous amount of self-discipline and hard work, but it will bring glory to God, as well as show those around us the love of Christ.

We can build businesses, provide products and services, and positively influence the world around us not for our personal gain and individual fame, but for the glory of God. As a result, what we produce and the way we treat others in the process reflects a greater and longer-lasting truth about who God is more than anything this world has to offer alone.

Martin Luther King, Jr. famously said:

"If a man is called to be a street sweeper, he should sweep streets even as Michelangelo painted, or Beethoven composed music, or Shakespeare wrote poetry. He should sweep streets so well that all the hosts of heaven and earth will pause to say, 'Here lived a great street sweeper who did his job well.'"

As we pursue excellence, it's important that we don't try to win at all costs. Instead, we have to win the right way, to earn the opportunity to encourage others to embrace Jesus' Way.

Group Discussion	Our commitment to excellence is what sets us apart, not for our own glory but so that we may direct people's gaze onto God. Here are a few questions to get you started: • Are you driven by the glory of God or the pleasure of people? • How can you strike a balance between excellence and perfectionism? Facilitator asks if any members would like to share an action they are committing to take this month based on the discussion. • Group members share any practice they would like to start or discontinue in their personal life of business via Zoom chat or post-it note • Other members agree to pray for and hold them accountable.	45-60 mins

Discussion Questions

Here are a few more questions to help your group go even deeper in discussion.

GOD ASKS FOR OUR BEST WORK

We report to a higher authority. And so we seek to serve him with the highest-quality work possible. We can safely assume that no wobbly chairs came out of the carpenter's shop in Nazareth, so we must follow the example of our Savior and seek excellence in every aspect of our daily job.

JOB WELL DONE

Not only does God recognize when something is good—or excellent—he shows appreciation for a job well done by recognizing the very fact that it is just that—a job well done.

5 Ideas to Explore the Mark Further

There's no limit to the ways you can explore the Marks of a Faith Driven Entrepreneur. What we provide below are five ideas we think might lead each one of us to an even greater understanding of our God-given call to create.

- 1. **Journal:** Where does excellence end and perfectionism begin? It's a tightrope we walk everyday as we pursue quality in our work. As soon as this drive to be the best becomes all about us—our reputation, our glory, our name—we run the risk of our work becoming self-gratifying rather than an offering to God. Write about that and what it looks like for you to pursue excellence rather than perfectionism.
- 2. Interact: We believe that we were created in the image of God—a God who worked 6 days and whose work was "good". We also know that His work continues to this day. This understanding as God's image bearer, together with the gratitude that comes from the gift of life, now and forever, provides us with a nuclear energy source that allows us to strive for, and achieve excellence.
- 3. Consider: Colossians 3:23 and 1 Corinthians 10:31 are both saying similar things work hard at everything you do in order to bring glory to God. Don't do it to gain worldly recognition. This can apply to a job you may not love or a task you'd rather skip over. You may look at these circumstances as beneath or unworthy of your attention. But in fact, we are called to a greater understanding of work. We need to be working as if God were the owner of our business. And our attention to it is an act of worship to who he is and what he means to us.
- 4. Act Differently: Establish a program for professional development within your company. Go through it yourself. Invite your employees to do the same. What ways can you pursue professional development as a solo-preneur? Never stop learning and growing so you can be the best you can be in your trade, industry, or craft.
